## Animal Welfare

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor for the welfare of the animals entered for competition in the AgriScot classes. If, in the opinion of the Official Stewards and/or Official Veterinary Surgeon, any animal is mistreated, or presented for judging in anything other than an approved state, then that exhibitor will be barred from presenting any of his animals for judging, and all prize money will be withheld.

If any animal requires hypodermic injection or artificial stimulant for any reason whatsoever the veterinary officer or, failing that, the chief steward must be informed before the action takes place and must be witness to the action. 24 hour site-wide CCTV will be in operation.

Any exhibitor or his representative found to be using methods which could be construed as malpractice will, along with his animals, be removed from the showground immediately, and all prize money withheld. Exhibitors in any doubt about what constitutes malpractice should consult the Official Stewards. All animals may be subject to tests and exhibitors may be asked to present a veterinary certificate.

The Stewards appointed by the AgriScot Board of Directors will be doing all they can to ensure the well-being of exhibitors and animals, and ask for the co-operation of exhibitors.

## Rules and Regulations for Showing Dairy Cattle

### 1. Disclaimer

The term "Exhibitor" includes persons taking part in any competition or display arranged by the Organiser and the owner of any animal, plant, piece of machinery or anything involved in any such competition or display at AgriScot. Save for the death or personal injury caused by breach of its duty, the Organiser will not be responsible for death, injury, disease, damage or loss caused to any exhibitor or to his or her servant or agent, or to any animal, article, plant, piece of machinery, or thing of whatever nature brought onto the showground by the said exhibitor from whatever cause, death, injury, disease, damage or loss arises.

(Save as aforesaid) the exhibitor shall indemnify the Organiser against all claims, damages and expenses whatsoever in any way arising out of the presence of the exhibitor, his servants, agents, exhibits, vehicles or equipment on the showground and shall assume full responsibility therefor.

Acceptance of the foregoing provisions shall be a condition of entry.

Exhibitors are advised to insure against fire and other appropriate risk, not only as regards their own property, but also against any third party claims.

### 2. Notifiable Disease

Any animal which shows signs suspicious of any notifiable disease must be reported immediately to AgriScot's Official Veterinary Surgeon or Chief Steward.



They will then report their suspicion to the Veterinary Lead Scotland (VLS), and all requests and instructions by the Official Veterinary Surgeon, the Chief Steward or the Veterinary Lead Scotland (VLS) concerning the suspect animal must be complied with.

- **BVD**

All animals that are entered to exhibit at AgriScot must come from a herd that is negative for BVD or the individual animal must have tested negative for the BVD virus, in accordance with the BVD (Scotland) Order 2019 prior to the event. Please note, animals from a BVD positive herd in Scotland (i.e. where there is one or more BVD positive animals) will not be accepted, regardless of individual BVD status. Animals coming from outside Scotland must have come from a CHCS accredited herd or have been individually tested negative for BVD virus. All relevant paperwork must accompany stock.

- **Brucellosis/TB**

AgriScot is fully accredited under the Brucellosis Schemes, and all animals must conform to the regulations of the Scottish Government. Cattle will only be accepted from herds which are not under any restriction under the Brucellosis or TB Orders.

Cattle from herds which are not under any movement restrictions may be eligible to enter the show but please note the following:

- Cattle from Scotland may also be exhibited at AgriScot, and providing cattle return directly home to Scotland after attendance at a show, they do not require to be post movement tested for TB.
- AgriScot understands that cattle from England and Wales may need to undertake a pre-movement test to exhibit at AgriScot. A pre-movement test with a negative result is required for any cattle coming from the High Risk or Edge Areas, and those from the LRA that are subject to annual, or more frequent, herd testing.
- AgriScot understands that cattle moved from herds in the Low Risk Area of England to non-exempt shows in the rest of England or in Wales will need to be post movement tested within 60-120 days after they return home, and require a negative result before moving again. A non-exempt show is one that lasts more than 24 hours and/or where the cattle are housed. As such, cattle from the Low Risk Area of England can attend AgriScot, providing they are not awaiting negative post movement test results following attendance at another non-exempt show.

It is the individual owners responsibility to ensure that all TB testing and standstill rules are complied with and all exhibitors are advised to check with their local Animal & Plant Health Agency (APHA) office before entering cattle for AgriScot.

Exhibitors must notify the Official Veterinary Surgeon if any of their cattle calve or show any evidence of calving at the show. The animals will then be placed in the approved isolation boxes pending their possible early removal from the showground. The decision of the Official Veterinary Surgeon will in such cases be final, and he will also have absolute control of the boxes.

Where an animal calves prematurely or aborts, the Official Veterinary Surgeon must be informed immediately. The animal must be placed in isolation in the approved accommodation, and the full range of samples (including if at all possible a placental smear)

shall be taken. The animal will not be allowed to take further part in the show, and once it is fit to travel can return home to its registered premises; or alternatively can be retained in the isolation boxes until the end of the show. All other Bovine animals from the same registered premises will not be allowed to compete further in the show until negative results from certain tests carried out by the Veterinary Investigation Centre (RBPT and microscopic examination of a vaginal smear from the aborted animal) have been received. They can be returned with the suspect animal at the completion of the show. Further information regarding the relevant Scottish Government orders can be provided on request. ### **3. Cattle Health**

No separate facilities will be available for cattle in any IBR/BVD or other control scheme. Exhibitors may wish to discuss vaccination of cattle with their own vet prior to the event.

### **4. Registration/Milk Recording**

All breeds will be exhibited under their Breed Society Conditions. All dairy cattle must be registered in the Herd Book or be in the grading-up appendices to the Herd Book of the appropriate Breed Society. Animals registered as ASR (SRA) under the Holstein Herd Book are not eligible. Animals entered in the Ayrshire classes must be registered in the Ayrshire Cattle Society Herd Book and be at least 51% Ayrshire blood. If Black and White in colour animals must be registered in the Herd Book's full pedigree Ayrshire Section and be 100% Ayrshire blood. (Note: Percentages are shown on all registration certificates). All animals for the British Red and White classes can be registered with any Breed Society. All entries must be officially milk recorded. All animals must comply with these requirements.

### **5. Records**

Identification registrations, milk record certificates and cattle passports must accompany the animals to AgriScot and must be available for inspection by the Stewards at any time. All cattle movements within Scotland must be notified to ScotEID. The keeper is responsible for notifying the movement 'off' their holding and the movement of any animals back 'on' to their holding to ScotEID. For a holding in England or Wales, the keeper will continue to notify 'off' and 'on' holding movements to BCMS. The show organisers will be responsible for notifying ScotEID of movements onto and off the showground.

All cattle movements must be notified to either BCMS or ScotEID (depending on the location of the keeper's holding) within 3 days of the movement. Movements can be notified either electronically or by telephone. To ensure the accurate traceability of cattle and to minimise the risk of disease spread, electronic reporting is the recommended option. This information should also be recorded in the on-farm holding register. Please note that for traceability purposes ScotEID may request the final destination of the holding the cattle are moving to when recording movements.

### **6. Biosecurity**

Exhibitors are required under legislation to cleanse and disinfect transport vehicles that have carried stock as soon as possible and in any case within 24 hours. Robust footwear should be worn which is capable of being disinfected at the show.

### **7. Arrival of Cattle**

Dairy cattle will only be admitted to the showground between 9am and 8pm on Monday 14 November unless prior arrangements have been made with the Dairy Shed Steward.

## CLASSES

**Any Other Breeds** – Classes 1, 6

**Ayrshire** – Classes 5, 10, 13

**British Red and White** – Classes 2, 7

**Holstein** – Classes 4, 9, 12, 14

**Jersey** – Classes 3, 8, 11

1. Any other Dairy Breeds Heifer, must have calved by three years of age.
2. British Red and White Heifer in milk; must have calved by three years of age.
3. Jersey Heifer in milk; must have calved by three years of age.
4. Holstein Heifer in milk; must have calved by three years of age.
5. Ayrshire Heifer in milk; must have calved by three years of age.

**Heifer Champions** – First and second prize winners in each heifer class.

**SuperHeifer Award** – The five breed champions.

6. Any other Breed Cow in milk in second or later lactation.
7. British Red and White Cow in milk in second or later lactation.
8. Jersey Cow in milk in second or third lactation.
9. Holstein Cow – Junior in second lactation.
10. Ayrshire Cow in milk in second lactation.
11. Jersey Cow in milk in fourth or later lactation.
12. Holstein Cow – Intermediate in third lactation.
13. Ayrshire Cow in milk in third or later lactation.
14. Holstein Cow – Senior in fourth or later lactation.

**Cow Champions** – First and second prize winners in each cow class.

**SuperCow Award** – The five breed champions.

All entrants in classes 1 to 14 will be automatically entered and placed for the Profitable Lifetime Index Awards.

In any class of between 12 and 16 animals the class could be split at the discretion of the Chief Steward with show prize money also being split. The 16 or over rule would remain as would the PLI prize money for the whole class. If more than 16 animals are entered for a class then it will be split on age basis with prize winners receiving full awards and entry to championships. If less than 16 animals are entered then, at the discretion of the Chief Steward, prize money will be shared. In the event that less than 5 animals are entered in a class then the stewards will amalgamate classes.

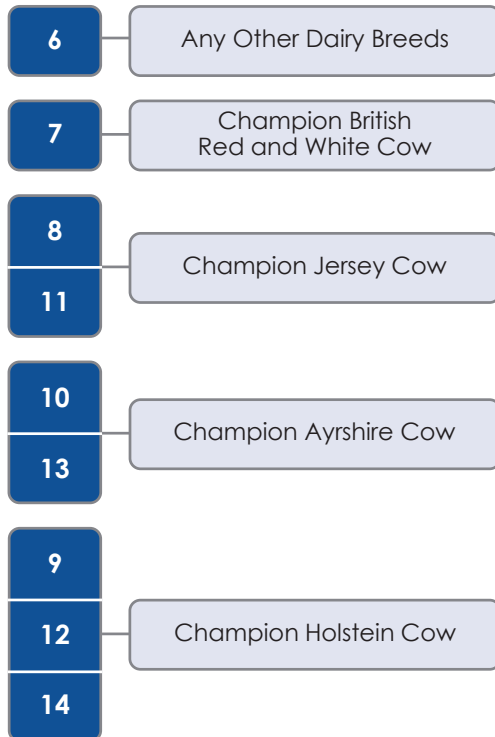

## 8. Departure of Cattle

Cattle will be permitted to leave the showground at the close of AgriScot – from 5.30pm until 8pm on 16 November, and from 6am on 17 November. All cattle must be removed by 10am on 17 November. Any movement outwith these hours can only be made with the approval of the Dairy Shed Steward. Prize money will be withheld if these conditions are not met.

## 9. Veterinary Inspection/Services

All cattle will be subject to veterinary inspection on entering and at any time in the showground, if requested by the Veterinary Surgeon or Chief Steward. Any vet services required will be paid for by the exhibitor.

## 10. Timing – Judging Starts 9.30am

A programme of judging times will be available to exhibitors on the evening of 15 November, and will be strictly adhered to unless instructed otherwise by the Chief Cattle Steward. The order of judging appears on Page 4 – the actual times will be declared when the number of entries in each class is known. Exhibitors will be solely responsible for having their animals ready for entering the judging ring. Cattle will enter the ring in age order.

## 11. Limit of Entries

The Organiser reserves the right to limit entries should the number of entries exceed the available stalling accommodation.

## 12. Stalling

Exhibitors will be permitted to use their stall space for the presentation of information and publicity material relating to the animals present or herd represented, but may not in any circumstances advertise on behalf of a third party. Under no circumstances should the stalling be dismantled or altered in any way.

Please note that clipping may only be carried out in the designated stalls. Exhibitors are not permitted to bring cattle crushes, crates or other mobile handling devices in to the Livestock Hall.

## 13. Head Boards

Only official headboard supplied with completed information from the Organiser may be used. All stock exhibitors must have readily available on arrival at the Royal Highland Centre official milk record information. Exhibitors must return the requested information on all animals that will possibly be exhibited ten days before the event.

## 14. Milking Facilities

A fully operational milking parlour will be on site at AgriScot. Milk produced becomes the property of the Organiser and no direct payment will be made to exhibitors. The Dairy Shed Steward must be informed of any animal receiving antibiotic treatment, and all milk from that animal must be disposed of at the direction of the Steward. Under no circumstances should that milk be added to the bulk tank. A strict policy of no washing to take place in the Milking Facility applies.

## 15. Electrical Equipment

It is a condition of entry that all exhibitors should provide and use circuit breakers with all electrical equipment.

All electrical equipment – no matter how small – must have a current PAT (Portable Appliance Test) Certificate. These certificates must be available for inspection by Pratt Bros Exhibitions Ltd on





the day prior to AgriScot; they may also be required for inspection by City of Edinburgh Council officials.

Please note that kitchen appliances (kettles etc) may only be used in the designated kitchen/ rest areas.

Extension cables and gang plugs may only be used where deemed safe to do so and with the prior permission of a steward.

## 16. Protests

All protests/appeals must be made in writing to the Chief Steward and must be accompanied by a deposit of £20 which will be returned if the protest/appeal is upheld. Protests/appeals must be made within 30 minutes of relevant results being announced.

Exhibitors are solely responsible for the accuracy and eligibility of their entries, which must be accompanied by the appropriate payment.

Exhibitors must abide by the Rules and Regulations of AgriScot, and must also observe the Rules of the appropriate Breed Society.

## 17. Entry Fees

£25 + VAT for each stall. Bookings to be received by 28 October with payment. Late entry will incur an additional fee of £25. No entries will be accepted after 4 November.

Only in exceptional circumstances will entry fees be refunded. Only one stall will be allocated for each animal as space will be allocated for tack.

## 18. Accommodation – Holiday Inn Express, Edinburgh Airport

Limited accommodation in the hotel has been reserved by the Organiser for the exclusive use of exhibitors and will be provided on a first come first served basis. Please book early due to all other hotels being full.

The Board of Directors reserve the right to allocate rooms to ensure the best use of the facilities available. To assist administration of sharing arrangements, please give names of people occupying a room, and state whether male or female.

A limited number of rooms will be available:

## 19. Interpretation of Rules

The decisions of the Chief Steward and Organiser are in all matters final. The Organiser reserves the right to refuse entries or to reject any animal. Exhibitors must abide by the Rules and Regulations of AgriScot.

## 20. Conduct and Disciplinary Procedures

Everyone involved with the livestock classes is expected to behave in a respectful and courteous manner. Instances of unacceptable conduct will be reviewed by the AgriScot Disciplinary Committee and any appropriate sanctions will be communicated in a timely manner.
